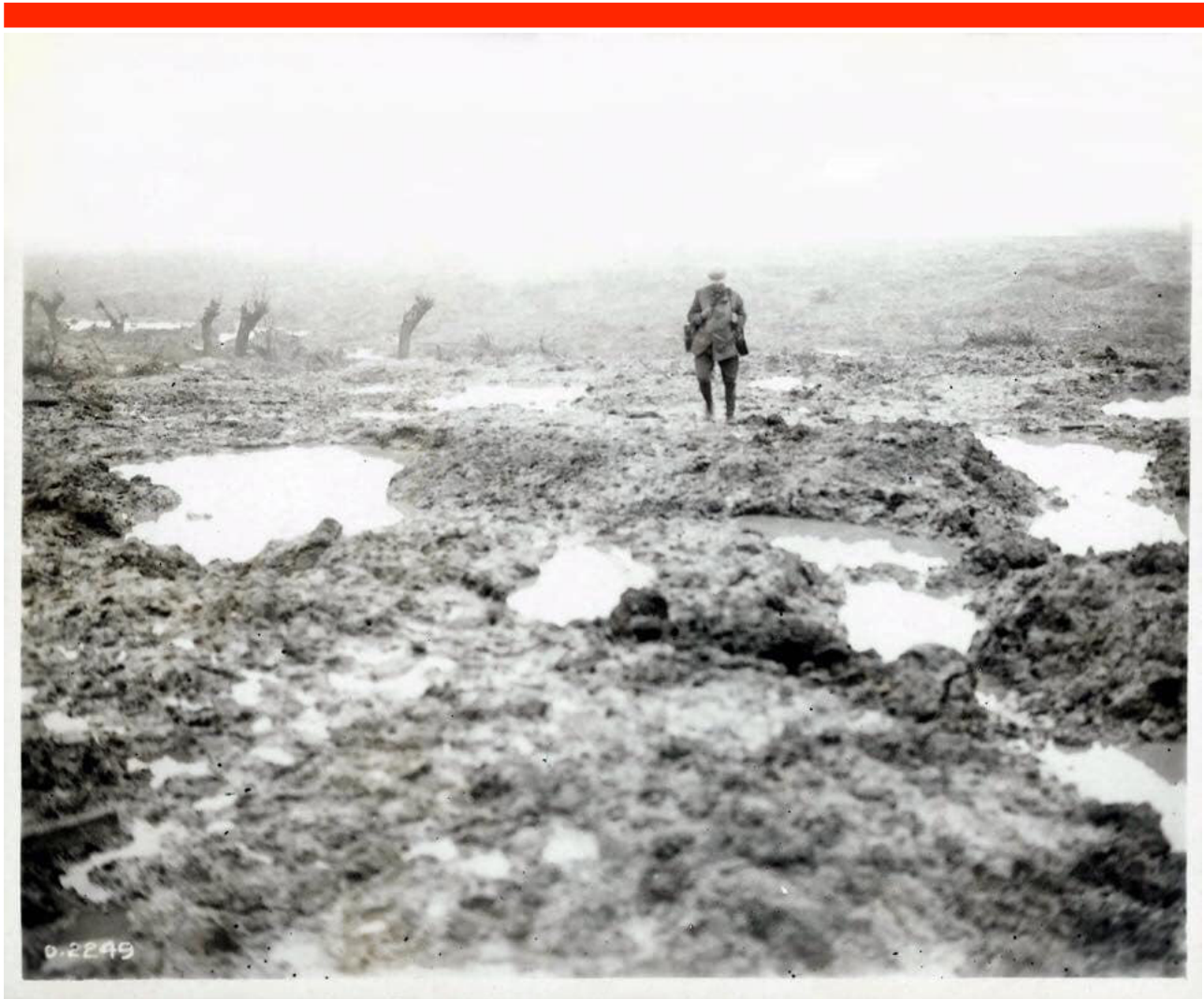

VJ 2020 - Carrickfergus and Larne aircrew died together over Burma

Sergeant Trevor Barkley Boyd - 1145139 - Royal Air Force Reserve, was born in Greenisland, Carrickfergus in 1922. He was killed in the air on a bombing run over Burma on 23rd/24th February 1944 aged 22.

Trevor was the son of Edgar and Margaret Jessie Boyd of Greenisland and like many others in Northern Ireland during the war enlisted with the Royal Airforce Reserve. He was assigned to a B-24 Liberator bombing crew as one of the 11

man crew. On the evening of 23/02/1944 he and the B-24 crew of BZ951 were on a bombing mission en route to Sinde in Burma when the aircraft was lost in the sky due to an explosion. Records on the event are vague but it appears that the entire crew were lost and none of the men were ever recovered for burial. The entire crew including Trevor are remembered on the Singapore Memorial, Malaya on column 43 .The crew included another County Antrim man, flight Sergeant David Nelson from Larne.

Simple heroism and dogged fighting against overwhelming odds - Primate's Tribute at Stronge memorial service

Contemporary newspaper report - A memorial service for the late, Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge, Royal Irish Fusiliers, and of all friends, especially of the Ulster

and Canadian Divisions, who had laid down their lives in the war, was held in Tynan Parish Church.

Many members of the Audience wore mourning armlet's with the initials "J. S." , embroidered thereon. Colonel Fitzgerald and Captain McElwaine represented the Irish Fusiliers. The officiating clergy were his Grace the Lord Primate, Canon Tichbounne, Rev. N. St. G. Sides, and. the Rector, Rev. W. H. Fitzmaurice. The "Last Post " was sounded from the chancel by -bugler of the 10th Royal Irish Fusiliers, under Bandmaster F. May. The collection was in aid of the funds of the Ulster Volunteer Hospital. Miss Hannah McMaster presided efficiently at the organ.

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life"

The Lord Primate based his address on the words "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" -Rev. 22nd Chap., 10th verse. He said to-day they were face to face with a conflict and a cross, and the only thing that gave them comfort and hope was the assurance of the crown of life. In two memorable engagements the men of the Ulster Division had won undying fame not only for their own province but for the whole of Ireland. First of all on the 1st July last year at Thiepval, and on August 16th this year at what you they might call the fourth battle of Ypres, their province had lost thousands of their noblest and best, and the Division on both occasions tried to do the impossible. In between. In between these two dates there came the splendid fight at Messines, in which the men of Ulster helped to carry the flag to successful victory. One great war correspondent spoke of the recent battle in these words :-

"For simple heroism and dogged fighting against overwhelming odds there has been no finer effort by any British troops since the war began." It was in that fight that their beloved comrade, Sir James Stronge, fell, wounded unto death, after bringing up through shot and shell the supplies of water, food, and munitions that the men sorely needed.

Lieutenant Stronge

He (his Grace) had read the testimony of officers and men alike to his patience, resourcefulness, and courage, One who had a right to speak said that Lieutenant Stronge never set his men a task to do that he would not gladly do himself. So considerate, so thoughtful of others, so whole-hearted in everything he did in his short life, the gallant young officer seemed to have compressed the work of fifty years and more. Thank God for the record of such a life! And with Lieutenant Stronge's name that day they linked all those Ulstermen who had taught them by their lives and death the glory of sacrifice, of service, of duty and honour, more especially the men whose names were registered on the roll of honour of that parish. In conclusion, his Grace said it was a noble thing for their men to have offered their services in this war for God against the devil than to have rested quietly at home. They were all proud of their Ulstermen who had gone forth to save the world.

Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge was killed in action during the "Third Battle of Ypres" otherwise battle of



"Langemarck," 16th August, 1917. James was the only son of James Henry Stronge, Baronet, and Ethel Margaret Strong nee Burges, of Tynan Abbey, Tynan, County Armagh. Deceased was twenty-six years of age, and is interred in Brandhoek New Military Cemetery No.3, Belgium.

Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge is locally commemorated on the Armagh City War Memorial.

Lieutenant Stronge's headstone epitaph reads:- " MORS JANUA VITAE." which translates to "Death is the door of life."

On this day – August 16

1914

A 25-year-old drifter from Austria named Adolf Hitler enlists to fight in the German Army's 16th Bavarian Reserve

Infantry. Before the war is over, he'll be awarded two Iron Crosses and be promoted to corporal.

1916

The French take a system of German trenches near Belloy-en-Santerre (southern Somme) on a front of 1,300 yards. A reported 1,300 German prisoners captured.

1917

At 04:45 AM the 36th (Ulster) & 16th (Irish) Divisions commenced an attack on a series of strongly fortified German Positions east of Ypres in what became known as The Battle of Langemarck. This was one of the phases of the Third Battle Of Ypres. Between the 2nd August & the 18th August the total casualties for the 36th would mount to around 4'400. This would be the last time the two Irish Divisions would fight side by side.

The Allies attack on a 9 mile front N of the Ypres-Menin road, over Steenbeek River, capturing all objectives. British carry Langemarck. On the high ground N of the Menin Road the Germans press back the British from ground won earlier in the day.



Fr. Willie Doyle from Dublin was killed at Passchendaele having run “all day hither and thither over the battlefield like

an angel of mercy". He was chaplain to the 16th Irish Division but was loved by men of all faiths.

1941

“Failure to dislodge the Turkish force at the Dardanelles at the first attempt should have resulted in withdrawal but the allied command insisted on another assault and this saw the first “New” Irish Division , the 10th, pressed in to service at ANZAC Cove and Suvla Bay. They fought bravely under very difficult conditions - heat, thirst, hunger, flies and the ever-[resent stench of

unburied bodies which lay in ravines throughout the battlefield. Eventually in December troops were withdrawn. Churchill was removed from the Cabinet and 3,500 10th (Irish) Division were among the dead”.

Royal Dublin Fusiliers, 7th Btn. D Coy. Corporal. 14156. Died 16/08/1915. Age 21. Born 58 Ypper Mount St., Dublin on 01/04/1894. Son of Mr. C. H. Crookshank, K.C., and Elizabeth Henrietta (nee Stokes) Crookshank who later lived at Woodbank, Whiteabbey. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli). Irish War WW1 Memorial, Belfast

+DEVLIN, Robert

5th Royal Irish Regiment. Private 2794. Formerly Private 11168, Royal Irish Rifles. Died 16/08/1915. He enlisted 27/08/1914 and was posted as Private 11168, Royal Irish Rifles. On 15/01/1915 he was transferred and posted into, as Private 2794, Royal Irish Regiment. On 15/03/1915 he was appointed (unpaid) Lance Corporal and on 22/06/1915, at his own request, reverted to Private. He served with the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force from the 08/07/1915 until his death. Born 27/02/1895. Son of David and Martha Devlin, who in 1901, were living at 25, Raby Street, Ormeau Road. In 1911 he was living with his parents and siblings at 28, Walmer Street, Ormeau Road, Belfast and he was an apprentice joiner. Helles Memorial, Gallipoli, Turkey. +DUNN, Frederick James

5th Bn. Royal Irish Regiment. Private. 3114. Died 16/08/1915. Aged 33. Husband to Edith Mary Dunn, of 1, Manor Terrace, Clewer Green, Windsor. Helles Memorial, Gallipoli, Turkey

+ELLIOTT, Thomas Cecil Moore

Royal Dublin Fusiliers. 7th Bn. D Coy. Private 10650. Died 16/08/1915. Age 22. Portora Royal School 1907 - 1911. In the 1st XV 1910 - 11. Then to TCD. He joined the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. He was one of five Portorans to die at Gallipoli. On the night of 15/16 he was fighting against a Turkish counter-attack. The Dubliners were at a severe disadvantage beneath the crest of a hill, for the Turks were well-armed with hand grenades which they lobbed over the Crest. Captain Poole Hickman the CO of D Company was ordered to lead a bayonet charge over the crest of Kirec Tepe Sirti in a desperate attempt to hold the position. He was killed immediately he came out into the open, and of the men who followed him only four returned alive. Son of John, a solicitor, and Margaret Elliott, of Bowling Green, Strabane. +FLOYD, Charles

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 6th Btn. Private. 11367. Died 16/08/1915. Born in Shankill, Co. Antrim, he enlisted at Belfast. Helles Memorial, Gallipoli, Turkey

+GIBSON, Robert J

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 5th Btn. Private. 13093. Died 16/08/1915. Age 32. Husband of Agnes L. Gibson, of 26, Brennan St., Belfast. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli)

+HARKINS, Francis

Royal Irish Fusiliers. Lance Corporal. 13921. Died 16/08/1915. Helles Memorial, Gallipoli, Turkey

+JEFFERS, James

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 5th Btn. Private. 11838. Died 16/08/1915. Son of James and Sarah Jeffers, 26 Fowlers Entry, Portadown, Co. Armagh. Portadown News: 13th November 1915: "Mrs. Jeffers, Fowlers Entry, Portadown, is anxious to hear news concerning her husband, Private James Jeffers, who has been posted wounded and missing since September 16th. He was serving at the Dardanelles". Helles Memorial, Turkey

+McCORMICK, Henry

Royal Irish Fusiliers. 5th Btn. D Coy. Private. 16388. Died 16/08/1915. Age 29. Son of James and Mary McCormick, of 2, Pates Lane, Killowen, Coleraine; husband to Edith McCormick, of 3, Dunlop St., Coleraine, Co. Londonderry. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli)

+McGONIGAL, Thomas

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. 5th Btn. Private. 14284. Died 16/08/1915. Age 26 years old. Son of Fredrick and Eliza Jane McGonigal, of Tobermore. Hill 10 Cemetery, Turkey (including Gallipoli)

+NEESON, James

Royal Munster Fusiliers, 7th Btn. Private. 5308. Died 16/08/1915. Age 23. Born at Ballylummin, Ahoghill. By 1911 he was living in Ballynure working as a farm servant. Prior to enlistment he worked at Ballyclare Green. Enlisted Belfast having previously served with the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers (13001). Son of Thomas and Ellen (nee Morgan) Neeson, of Ballybeg, Ahoghill, Ballymena. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli). Ballyclare WM

+OLIVER, Robert

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 6th Btn. D Coy. Rifleman. 11210. Died 17/08/1915. Age 27. Son of Mary E. Oliver, of Bangor, Co. Down, and the late Capt. Gilbert Oliver; husband to Margaret Oliver, of 9, Chater St., Belfast. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli)

+ROBB, William

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 5th Btn. Private. 12345. Died 16/08/1915. Age 21. Born Ballyhenry 08/10/1893. Enlisted in Bothwell, Scotland. Son of William Robb and Charlotte (nee Graham) Robb, of Carnmoney, Belfast. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli). Carnmoney Presbyterian Church RH

+SMYTH, Thomas McIntyre

7th Seaforth Highlanders. Private. S/1943. Died 16/08/1915. Born at Dungall, Clough, and enlisted in Johnstone, Scotland. Le Touret Memorial.

+WARNOCK, Hector Adolphus Hugh

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 4th Bn. attd. 1st Bn. Died 16/08/1915. Aged 22. Son of Mrs. M. I. Warnock, of Glenalla, Clogher, Co. Tyrone, and the late Hugh Warnock, M.D. Achiet-le-Grand Extension, Pas de Calais, France

+WILSON, Alexander Simms

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 5th Btn. Private. 12717. Died 16/08/1915. Age 21. Son of William and Elizabeth Wilson, of 140, Earl St., Belfast. Helles Memorial, Turkey (including Gallipoli)

1916

+BRUCE, Robert

The King's (Liverpool Regiment), 13th Btn. Private. 24049. Died 16/08/1916. Born at Cloghogue, Duneane (There are two townlands named Cloghogue. Cloghogue, Duneane is near Toome/Toomebridge and Cloghogue, Drummaul is near Ahoghill) on 08/02/1882, the son of farmer William and carpenter's daughter Sarah Ann Bruce, nee Stewart, both of Cloghogue, Duneane. He enlisted in Manchester. Thiepval Memorial

+McCABE, John

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 7th/8th Btn. Lance Corporal. 18513. Died 16/08/1916. Age 21. Son of Bernard McCabe, of 46, Primrose Hill, Armagh. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+WHITLEY, William George

King's (Liverpool Regiment), 13th Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1916.

Age 22. QUB Training Corps 1915. Son of Henry and Annie Whitley, of "Florida," Ardenlee Parade, Belfast. Guillemont Road Cemetery, Guillemont, Somme, France.

1917

The battle of Langemarck lasted from 16 to 18 August 1917.

+ADAIR, George

Royal Irish Rifles. 11th Btn, Rifleman. 2243. Died 16/08/1917. Age 20. He lived in Crumlin, and was a member of Ballynadrenta LOL 1059 in Glenavy and of the UVF. He enlisted at Randalstown and served in D Company 11 RIR, embarking with them for France from Bordon Camp in October 1915. Son of Mary Adair, of Seacash, British, Crumlin, Co. Antrim, and the late James Adair. Widower and railway worker (plate layer) James Adair had married Mary Richardson, a servant, in Antrim's 2nd Presbyterian Church on 27/12/1892. The couple had had six children by the time of the 1911 census. George was their eldest surviving son and had been born on 20/01/1896 at Fountain Street, Antrim. + ADAMS, James

Royal Irish Rifles, 11th Btn. Corporal. 16150. Died 16/07/1917. Age 26. Son of Henry Adams, of Muckamore; husband of Maggie Adams (nee McGrubb), of Church St., Antrim. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+ADAMS, William James Alexander

Royal Irish Rifles, 11th Btn. Corporal. 16150. Died 16/08/1917. Age 26. Born Dunadry. A gardener, he was a member of the UVF. Enlisted Belfast. His brother Harry (Henry) also served. Son of Henry Adams, of Muckamore; husband to Maggie Adams (nee McGrubb), of Church St., Antrim. They married in First Antrim Presbyterian Church on 24/09/1913. Parents of David and Kathleen. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium. First Antrim Presbyterian Church WM

+AGNEW, James

Royal Irish Rifles, 7th Btn. Rifleman. 5037. Died 16/08/1917. Wounded in August 1916. Born in Belfast and living in Dunmurry (or Belfast), he enlisted at Lisburn, possibly in 2 RIR, and later served in 7 RIR (5037). Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, Belgium

+AGNEW, James

Royal Irish Rifles, 14th Btn. Rifleman. 42470. Died 16/07/1917. Age 19. Son of Samuel and Maria Agnew, of 147, Dee St., Belfast. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+ALLEN, G

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. 9th Btn. Private. 23847. Died 16/08/1917. Age 22. Son of William and Rebecca Allen, of Londonderry. Brandhoek Military Cemetery, Belgium

+ANDERSON, Alex

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. 10th Btn. Private. 15285. Died 16/08/1917. Age 24. Son of Mr. R. Anderson, of Boden Fort, Ballymoney. Alex Anderson was born in New Hampshire, England on 24/12/1892. He was married with two children. One son named Michael and one daughter named Elizabeth. New Irish Farm Cemetery, Belgium

ANDREWS, David

Royal Irish Rifles, 14th Btn. Lance Corporal. 16168. Died 16/07/1917. From Belfast. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+ANDREWS, Frank

Royal Irish Fusiliers 9th Btn. Private. 24735. Died 16/07/1917. Age 40. Brother of David Andrews, of Magherana, Waringstown, Lurgan. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+ANDREWS, Joseph Hamiton Millar

Royal Irish Rifles, 11th Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1917. Aged 21. Son of James and Martha Andrews, of "Glenmont," Templemore Park, Londonderry. Ypres Reservoir Cemetery, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium

+ARMSTRONG, John Leslie

Royal Irish Rifles. 14th Btn. Company Serjeant Major. 16175. Died 16/08/1917. Age 24. Son of William and Emily Armstrong, of Erin View, 179, Clifton Park Avenue, Belfast. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+AYRE, Samuel

Royal Irish Rifles, 11th Btn. D Coy, Rifleman. 1281. Died 16/08/1917. Aged 28. Born in Kirkinnola, Co. Antrim, he lived in Glenavy or Crumlin, Co. Antrim. A

member of the Orange Order in Glenavy. He enlisted at Lisburn, embarking for France from Bordon Camp in October 1915. He was wounded on the Somme on 01/07/1916. Son of James Ayre of Glenavy. and husband of Rachel Ayre of Hill Street, Crumlin. Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, Belgium

+BAKER, Walter

Royal Irish Rifles, 14th Btn. Rifleman. 6916. Died 16/08/1917. Born in Lisburn, he lived in 10 Seymour Street in the town and was employed by Mr. Connor a cabinet maker. A member of the Church Lads' Brigade and the Temperance Silver Band, he enlisted at Belfast. He embarked for France in October 1915 and was home on his first leave in July 1917 five weeks before his death. He had two uncles and two cousins on active service. An only son, his mother and stepfather lived at 10 Seymour Street, Lisburn. Bridgehouse Cemetery, Langemarck, Belgium

+BALMER, Joseph

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 9th Btn. Corporal. 13986. Died 16/07/1917. Age 24. Son of Margaret Balmer of Mullavilly, Portadown. Tyne Cot Memorial, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium

+BAMBER, Robert

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 9th Btn. Trench Mortar Bty. Fusilier. Died 16/07/1917. His commanding officer wrote that he was struck by a shell and killed instantly. "He was a good boy and a brave soldier". Born Ahoghill.

+BARR, Patrick

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 4th Btn attached to 11th Btn. Drummer. 2208. Died 16/08/1917. Aged 33. Son of James and Sicilly Barr, 21, Waterloo Street, Derry. Husband of Jane Barr, Eden Place, Derry. Son-in-law of Mrs McGinley, 11, High Street, Derry. Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, West Vlaanderen, Belgium. Londonderry Diamond WM

+BARR, Robert

Royal Irish Rifles, 13th Btn. Company Serjeant Major. 26. Distinguished Conduct Medal. Died 16/07/1917. Age 31. Pre-war he was a polisher in the firm of T Procter and Son. He enlisted on the outbreak of war and went with the very first contingent to Clondeboyne Camp near Bangor. He was soon made Sergeant and moved with the Ulster Division to France. When he was promoted to Company Serjeant Major, he took part on the famous attack on the Schwaben Redoubt on 01/06/1916. He was partially buried by a shell but despite this continued to lead his men. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal in 1917 for this action. Son of Solomon and Elizabeth Barr, of

Dromore St., Banbridge; husband of Sarah Barr, of 80, Reilly St., Banbridge. They had two daughters. Solomon had been sexton of the parish church for many years. Tyne Cot Memorial, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium. Seapatricks Parish Church RH, Banbridge

+BAXTER, John

Royal Irish Rifles, 1st Btn. Rifleman. 40854. Died 16/08/1917. Age 28. Enlisted in the North Irish Horse on 07/06/1916, together with his older brother Ernest. He was issued regimental number 2191. He trained at the regiment's Antrim reserve camp until November 1916, when he and around 100 other North Irish Horsemen, including his brother, volunteered to transfer to the Royal Irish Rifles. The formal transfer took place on 7 December (Baxter was issued regimental number 40854), and on that day the men embarked for France. There they were posted to the 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, joining it on the Somme front on 12 December. On 16/08/1917 Baxter's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. The battalion war diary for the day listed 27 other ranks killed, 7 wounded and missing, 170 wounded, and 63 missing. Rifleman Baxter was one of men killed in action that day. One record states that he was working as a stretcher-bearer at the time. Born at The Hermitage, Waringstown, County Down, the second of four children of National School teacher Francis Baxter and his wife Anna Maria (née McCandless). The family later moved to nearby Donaghcloney. In the 1911 Census he was living at Donaghcloney, County Down, with his parents and three siblings. +BEATTIE, John James

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 11th Btn. Sergeant. 18319. Died 16/08/1917. Aged 32. Born in Hillsborough, he enlisted at Belfast. Husband to Sarah Beattie of Ballynahinch Street, Hillsborough, and son of James and Elizabeth Beattie of Lisburn Street, Hillsborough. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+BEATTIE, William

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 10th Btn. Private. 40637. Died 16/08/1917. Aged 19. Enlisted in the North Irish Horse at Antrim between 3 and 6 November 1915 (No. 1794). At the end of December 1916 he was one of forty North Irish Horsemen who volunteered to transfer to the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers (No. 40637). They embarked for France on 09/01/1917 and were posted to the 10th Battalion, joining it at Ploegsteert Wood on the Ypres front. Beattie's battalion was on the Ypres front at the beginning of the Third Ypres offensive in August 1917. It is likely that Beattie was wounded at this time. He was evacuated to a casualty clearing station, but died on 16 August. Born on 13/06/1898 at 9 Rosewood Street, Belfast, son of cloth passer Archibald

Beattie and his Swiss-born wife Emma (nee Maurer). By 1915 the family was living at 132 Mountcollyer Street, Alexandra Park, Belfast, the father working as a clerk for the York Street Flax Spinning Company. William was serving an apprenticeship in the Grove Weaving Company and, according to a newspaper report, "was an enthusiastic member of the 47th Belfast Company Boys' Brigade (St. Silas's), being one of the first recipients of the King's Medal". +BELL, Samuel

Royal Irish Rifles, 12th Btn. Rifleman. 12/4850. Died 16/08/1917. Age 19. Son of Thomas and Elizabeth Bell, of 44, Mill St., Larne. Tyne Cot Memorial, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium

+BELL, William

Royal Irish Rifles. 18th Btn. attd. 12th Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1917. Age 22. A Queen's undergraduate, on the outbreak of war, Jack Bill enlisted as a Private with the Royal Army Medical Corps before receiving a commission in the 18th Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles in April 1917. Jack Bill was attached to the 12th Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, when he was killed, aged 22, on 18/08/1917 during the Battle of Langemarck (Third Ypres)

Two of his fellow officers reported thus:

2nd Lt Branningan – "Mr Bill was hit before he got right over and his body was seen in front of our wire. Mr Bill was a great friend of mine."

2nd Lt Stokes – "This officer was last seen about map ref. D 19 b 10 90. He was lying on the ground apparently wounded in the groin or lower abdomen. Rifleman Matthews went out to dress him but was himself killed in the act of doing so, and it is supposed that the same bullet also hit Mr Bill. The men had by this time started coming back and Mr Bill was left behind apparently very seriously wounded."

The location identified is very close to Gallipoli Farm, just to the south of the Wieltje - Gravenstafel road. Jack Bill's body was not recovered

Jack Bill was born 08/07/1895 in Edinburgh, the son of Samuel Alexander and Grace Bill, who were missionaries. His grandfather was John Bill, a

builder, of Downshire Park, Cregagh. Samuel Alexander Bill (born in Belfast, 1864; died in Nigeria, 1942) was raised in Ballymacarrett Presbyterian Church.

The 1901 Ireland Census return for 77 Upper Newtownards Road indicates that Jack Bill (aged 5) was living with his paternal grandfather and grandmother, John and Betsy Bill. The Fitzroy Avenue church magazine, The Courier, records that Jack Bill and his sister resided with the family of the Rev. William Colquhoun whilst their parents were in the mission field. John Bill entered RBAI in January 1907 and, in 1910, he briefly left to board at a school in County Cavan. While at RBAI, he was a member of the cricket first XI and the rugby first XV, until an accident cut short his sporting career. He also took part in the school's "dramatic entertainments".

The family's address when Jack died is recorded as the Mission House, Qua Iboe, Southern Nigeria – the 1911 Ireland Census records that Grace, Emma and Jack Bill lived at 61 University Street and the return is annotated to the effect that the Head of the Household was "absent in Qua Iboe, West Africa". It had been Jack's intention was to follow his father as a missionary in Qua Iboe, an aspiration that was to be denied by the Great War.

After leaving RBAI, John went to Queen's University, Belfast, having been awarded the Drennan Exhibition, which was given to the First Literary Scholar of RBAI students in their first year.

He joined the 17th (Reserve) Royal Irish Rifles on 06/04/1915, subsequently being commissioned into the Royal Irish Fusiliers on 23/08/1915. Both he and his brother joined the 9th Battalion in April 1916, William serving with C Company. He was promoted to Lieutenant on 23/02/1917. William was killed by shellfire on 16th August 1917, at the age of 21, when leading his platoon into battle at the Battle of Langemarck (3rd Ypres). In all, the battalion suffered 456 casualties that day. Corporal O'Neill of the 9th Royal Irish Fusiliers wrote "Lt Boyd's platoon was immediately on my right during the advance at a strong point known as "Gallipoli". I regret to state that a shell burst just above our heads and several of us were wounded. I went to where I saw Lt Boyd laying and found that he was mortally wounded and he died soon after. I certify that the above is a true statement of how this splendid officer died at the head of his platoon." In the months following William's death, his mother wrote a number of letters regarding the fate of her son. As no body had been found, she wondered whether it was possible he had survived, perhaps being taken prisoner by the Germans. After the receipt of Corporal O'Neill's letter above, she wrote "I thank you for your letter and enclosure from Corp O'Neill in regards to the fate of my dear son. I wonder did Corp O'Neill see him dead or does he only think he died soon after he saw him. I have had several letters from soldiers who say they saw him badly wounded and think he died, but none saw him dead. The strange part is where is his body, as the British took back again 3 days after where his body was lying and the Red Cross say if the Germans buried him they would send word to the Red Cross Office. It is queer no trace can be found and the director of graves cannot locate his grave. One man wrote that he saw him wounded when they were going forward at 5 o'clock and coming back at 8.30 he saw him again and he was still living so between all reports I do not know what to believe." William's body was never recovered. Son of the late Rev. RH Boyd and of Sarah Louisa Boyd, Fitzroy, Carrickfergus. Tyne Cot Memorial. RBAI WM

Captain M'Connell, C.F., his chaplain, who was home from the front on seven days' leave, and who had held a service for the men before they went into battle on the 16th. Captain M'Connell spoke of the first time he had met Laurence Brown, when he and his brother were privates in the R.A.M.C. two years ago. He had been struck by his gentle, kindly disposition, and thought how well he was suited to this branch of the service. His desire was, however, to be in the fighting ranks, and he soon obtained a commission. He could at any time have got what the soldiers call a "soft job" as an intelligence officer, owing to his thorough knowledge of French and German, but he would not ask for this. It was only when those who had this knowledge were ordered to give in their names that he entered that department. Even then he returned from headquarters the night before the attack to lead his men once more. He was sent with a small detachment to find out the situation at a critical moment, and was, as might be expected, in front of his men when he was struck by a sniper's bullet. He only took a moment to steady himself, then waved on his men, and a few seconds later had passed into the Great Beyond. After leaving school he lived in Finchley, London. He enlisted as a private in the London Regiment, 28th Btn and went to France on 14/02/1915. He was later transferred to the 9th Btn. The Battalion took part in the battle of Hill 60 near Ypres, between 17 and 21 April 1915. The hill was eventually taken but with great loss to the battalion. Son of Henry Anthony and Dorothea Maunsell Burke, of Drumkeen, Ballinamallard, Co. Fermanagh. His father was a Sub Sheriff and land agent. He was chairman of the Lough Erne Drainage Board and died in 1942. Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial, Belgium. Portora RH

He was granted home leave on 21/04/1916 and arrived in Dublin on the 24th., the first day of the Easter Rising. He sought refuge in the Ship Street Military Barracks. He was not actively involved in suppressing the rebellion and returned to England on 02/05/1916.

In September 1916 he was sent to Fermoy Barracks in Cork, completed his training on 19/12/1916, and commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 3rd Btn. He was sent to Ebrington Barracks, Londonderry on 16/01/1917.

Posted to C Company 8th Btn. 16th (Irish) Division, he went to France on 28/02/1917. On August 16, Jack was wounded in his knee and was being brought to a regimental aid post by two stretcher-bearers, when they were hit by an exploding shell. Their bodies were never found.

Subsequent correspondence between the regiment and the family stated he had been recommended for the MC.

The letters which Jack wrote home to his mother and sisters were compiled into a book, "Memoirs of a young lieutenant", by his nephew, Samuel Carrothers.

At some point in the next two years he returned home, either wounded, sick or injured, before rejoining the regiment at its Antrim reserve. In November 1916 Connell, together with around 100 other North Irish Horsemen, volunteered to transfer to the Royal Irish Rifles (No.40862). They embarked for France on 7 December, where they joined the 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, on the Somme front. On 16/08/1917 Connell's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. Rifleman Connell was among the missing, and his death was later officially accepted. Rifleman Johnston was one of those killed in action that day. Initially reported as wounded, then as wounded and missing, it was announced that he and some others in the battalion had been awarded the Military Medal "for gallantry in action East of Ypres between 15/8/17 – 17/8/17". The *Belfast News-Letter* later reported that: A communication, which was addressed to Rifleman Johnston from the War Office, and which was forwarded to his mother about the time she received the intimation of his death, shows that he was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry and devotion to duty on 15th and 16th August last. Jim and I slept in the same tent before the attack and he seemed to know something would happen to him for he asked me to write and, if I could, to bring him back to a dressing station in case he was hurt but I thought he was joking. He was in good form before the attack. I was on his right flank. He went forward at the head of his men and did splendid work and showed a fine example of Irish pluck, leading and cheering his men on against fearful odds and machine gun fire. He was first at the enemy strongpoint but got shot in the chest before getting in. Although dying fast he urged the men on and his last words were, 'Tell my father and mother I died at the head of my men fighting for my country.' The Rev John Knowles, Presbyterian Chaplain, said that just as Jim had given the order for his men to rush the enemy position he was shot. He was commissioned in 1914, after graduating from QUB. He had initially joined the 10th Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers (RIF) in January 1916. Until May 1917 he served as a bombing instructor and was stationed in Newtownards where he was well known in the local community. He was involved in the suppression of the May 1916 Easter Rising. In June 1917, he was posted to France to join the 9th Battalion. He went to France and on 15/06/1917 he wrote a letter to his mother from the 36th. (Ulster) Division Base Depot at Le Havre. In it he intimated that he was going to the Front with the 9th Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers in 108th Brigade of the 36th. (Ulster) Division. The last letter that he wrote was to his father and it was dated 14/08/1917. In it he said that he was soon to be in action again and that he might not be able to write very much for a while. 'Whatever happens, don't worry', he wrote. He died in the battle for Passchendaele. Born 13/12/1892. Son of Elizabeth R. Moore, of Ashley House, Albert Bridge Rd., Belfast, and the late Dr. A. P. B. Moore. Dr Archibald Pollock Bailie Moore and Mrs Elizabeth Rogers Moore (nee Stevenson) were married on 10 April 1889 in Maghera Presbyterian Church, Co Londonderry. +MORRISON, Cyril Aubrey

He was grandson of linen manufacturer James Morrison of Keady, Armagh. By 1911 the family was living at Atlantic House, 101 Limestone Road, Belfast. Soon after, Morrison was employed as an apprentice electrical engineer at the shipbuilder Workman Clark.

Morrison enlisted in the North Irish Horse at Belfast on 24/08/1914 (No.1028), though aged just 17. He embarked for France on 04/05/1915, probably as part of D Squadron. In 1916 he was seriously injured by a kick from a horse and was evacuated home for treatment. After he recovered he rejoined the North Irish Horse at Antrim. In November 1916, together with around 100 other North Irish Horsemen, Morrison volunteered to transfer to the Royal Irish Rifles (No.40933). They embarked for France on 7 December, where they joined the 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, on the Somme front. In early

1917 Morrison was wounded, possibly during the attack in the sector in front of Bouchavesnes from 4 to 8 March, during which the 1st Battalion took significant casualties. However he recovered soon after and rejoined his battalion.

On 16/08/1917 Morrison's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. The battalion war diary for the day listed 27 other ranks killed, 7 wounded and missing, 170 wounded, and 63 missing. Rifleman Morrison was among the missing. His death was later officially accepted. However the following month he transferred to the Royal Irish Fusiliers (No.24909). In 1916 or early 1917 he embarked for France, where he joined the 9th (Service) Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers, and was posted to C Company. Presbyterian Church. The Murray family lived in the townlands of Drumawhey and Ballyblack, Newtownards. James Murray worked as a road contractor and farmer and he and Elizabeth had twelve children. Prior to the outbreak of the Great War Samuel Murray lived with two of his sisters, Maggie and Bella, at 99 Greenwell Street in Newtownards. After the outbreak of the Great War Samuel Murray was engaged in munitions work and he joined the Army in May 1917. After three months training he was drafted to France in August 1917 and after two weeks at the base he was sent up to the front line. It was reported in the Press that he went over the top at Langemarck on his 23rd birthday and that Rifleman Samuel Murray (No. 20/292) was killed in action that day. In fact, he was killed in action some eight days before his 24th birthday. At that time his brother Sydney was also on active service with the Royal Irish Rifles. Sydney Murray was shot in the eye, the bullet coming out through the back of his head. He survived the Great War but spent the remainder of his life in hospital at Downpatrick. He returned to the front in May last after recovering from wounds received in action on 1st July 1916. He was previously in the employment of Lafayette, Donegal Place, Belfast, as a photographer and was a member of the original YCVs. and of Clonavon, Ballymena". Son of Mr. And Mrs. S. Nevin, Finaghy Park, Belfast. His wife lived at Mill Street, Ballymena. Tyne Cot Memorial, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium.

On the 30/10/1915 the Northern Whig reported that Hugh had been wounded in France and that he was the son of Mrs Patton, King William Square, Bushmills who has received the following communication- "Dear Mrs Patton – I have just been talking to your son, Rifleman Hugh Patton who has been slightly wounded. I am pleased to tell you his wound is not serious. He is unable to write at present but there is no need for any undue anxiety as he is cheerful. Do not write at present as he will be sent further back. Yours sincerely W.H. Jeffries, Chaplain". Private Patton before enlisting was an assistant gardener in Dunvarden and was one of the first to join from the North Antrim Regiment U.V.F. He is commemorated on the Menin Gate Memorial to the Missing, Ypres, Belgium.

The Proctor family lived in Scotland and Ireland – in Bushmills, County Antrim; in Dublin and in Comber where they lived in Bridge Street and Killinchy Street. Reflecting their Scottish roots the name of their house in Killinchy Street was *Dalvourne*. James Proctor and Mary Jane Niblock were married on 17/12/1910 in Comber Non-Subscribing Presbyterian Church. Mary Jane Niblock aged 21 from Ballystockart was a daughter of John Niblock, a farmer. The Proctor family lived in Railway Street, Comber. James and Mary Jane Proctor (nee Niblock) had at least one child: John - born 25/12/1910 in the Maternity Hospital, Belfast. James Proctor worked as a commercial clerk and then as a brewer before he enlisted in Comber. He was wounded in action on 07/02/1916. He returned to active service. His brother Hugh also served with the 13th Battalion Royal Irish Rifles. Tyne Cot Cemetery, Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium. Comber and District WM; Comber Masonic Lodge No. 46 RH; First Comber Presbyterian Church RH

Royal Dublin Fusiliers. 3rd Btn. att'd. 2nd Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1917. Born on 02/01/1897 at Jarvis Street, Portadown, County Armagh, son of poulterer John Reavy and his wife Mary (nee Brown). Wilfred was educated at the Methodist School, Portadown. At the outbreak of war he was working as a clerk in the offices of the Daisy Hill Nurseries, Newry. He enlisted in the North Irish Horse at Portadown on 03/09/1914 (No.1124), overstating his age by two years.

On 01/11/1914 he was appointed unpaid lance corporal. On 1 December was promoted to corporal. Reavie embarked for France on 01/05/1915 with D Squadron of the North Irish Horse. He was made acting sergeant on 24 July and confirmed in that rank the following month. On 23/10/1916, after a month's course of instruction at the 3rd Army Infantry School, Reavie applied for a commission in the 9th Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers. His commanding officer Lord Cole, supporting the application, wrote that "He is well educated, keen and capable of commanding men."

Reavie departed for England in December and on 8 January 1917 reported for duty at the No.3 Officer Cadet Battalion, Bristol. On 26/04/1917 he was commissioned as a 2nd lieutenant and posted to the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion, Royal Dublin Fusiliers. Soon after he was sent to France and attached to the 2nd Battalion, then part of the 16th (Irish) Division, on the Ypres front.

On 16/08/1917 Reavie's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of the Third Ypres offensive. The battalion war diary recorded that from 15 to 17 August it lost 19 officers and men killed, 79 wounded, 13 gassed, and 21 missing. Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium.

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 10th Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1917. On leaving RBAI, he was a member of the Queen's University Training Corps from 01/11/1915 to 21/01/1916 and was working as a bank clerk when he enlisted with the 10th Btn, Royal Irish Fusiliers, a reserve battalion. He received his commission on 19/12/1916. He transferred to the 9th Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers and was killed in action on 16/08/1917, Private Brady of the battalion reported: "He was in command of VIII platoon. He was a young man and I knew him well; he was fair and very nice and well liked by everyone. I saw him during the attack; we were well over the ridge to the left of St Julien. His father John, from Maze, Lisburn, was a shoemaker who moved to Glasgow where he worked for the Belfast and Glasgow Boot Company. It was there he married his wife Elizabeth. Enlisted in the North Irish Horse at Antrim between 8 and 11 February 1916. In November 1916 Smith, together with around 100 other North Irish Horsemen, volunteered to transfer to the Royal Irish Rifles. They embarked for France on 7 December, where they joined the 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, on the Somme front. On 16/08/1917 Smith's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. The battalion war diary for the day listed 27 other ranks killed, 7 wounded and missing, 170 wounded, and 63 missing. Rifleman Smith was one of those initially reported as wounded, then soon after as wounded and missing. Later on, his death was officially accepted as having taken place 'on or since' 16/08/1917. Ploegsteert Memorial, Comines-Warneton, Hainaut, Belgium. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission register gives Smith's date of death as 6 September 1917. This may be a clerical error. Other records suggest that 16 August is much more likely. The 1st Battalion Royal Irish Rifles was well behind the lines on 6 September.

Gordon Smyth had joined the Training Corps in November 1914 and Eric Craig joined the unit in November 1915. Eric Craig received his commission in December 1915, being initially attached to the 20th (Reserve) Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles before leaving for

France in July 1916. Gordon Smyth received his commission in January 1916 and was transferred from the 20th Battalion to the 13th Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles on 20th June 1916. Gordon and Eric both paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country. In a letter dated 05/09/1916, Gordon reports that, whilst at Lewis Gun School, "I ran into M'Clinton and Stewart of North." The former was Arthur Norman McClinton of Windsor Park, who also belonged to Fitzroy Avenue Presbyterian Church, and the latter was Albert Lewis Stewart – both McClinton and Stewart had also been educated at RBAI and had represented Ireland in Rugby Union. Gordon Smyth survived his friend by less than a year. He was killed in action during the Battle of Langemarck (3rd Ypres). Son of F D Smyth, 111 University Street, Belfast. +STEELE-NICHOLSON, Alfred Francis James

Royal Irish Rifles, 5th Btn. att'd. 1st Btn. Captain. Died 16/08/1917. Age 31. Born on 05/11/1885 in Ballow House, Bangor. A son of James and Maria Steele-Nicholson (nee Macartney, sometimes McCartney) who were married on 30/10/1870 in Culdaff C of I Parish Church in Co Donegal. The Steele-Nicholson family lived in Falmore House, Co Donegal and in Ballow (sometimes Balloo) House, Bangor. James Steele-Nicholson described himself as a 'gentleman' and he and Maria had at least twelve children. At least five of the children were baptised in St. Comgall's C of I Parish Church, Bangor. James Steele-Nicholson died on 04/05/1899 in Ballow House (aged 80). Maria Steele-Nicholson died on 01/10/1926. The Steele-Nicholson family gained military distinction through Brigadier-General John Nicholson who was on active service between 1839 and 1857 in the Anglo-Afghan and Anglo-Sikh wars and the Indian Mutiny. Alfred Francis James Steele-Nicholson and William Herbert Hamilton Steele-Nicholson were grandsons of George Augustus Chichester Macartney of Holywood House, Co Down and their great-uncles, John and Arthur Macartney, were killed in action at the Khyber Pass during the Second Afghan War. Alfred Francis James Steele-

Nicholson attended Bangor Grammar School. He moved to the United States of America and returned in early 1915 to run a timber and creosoting business. On obtaining his commission on 15/06/1915 he was appointed to the 5th Battalion Royal Irish Rifles and on 06/06/1916 he joined the 1st Battalion. He was appointed acting Captain on 12/08/1917. When the war started he joined the Young Citizens Volunteers, which later became the 14th Battalion of the Royal Irish Rifles. Aubrey's elder brother Robert who served with the Royal Engineers, died in Mesopotamia, in May 1918. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

Royal Irish Rifles. 1st Btn. Rifleman. 40919. Died 16/08/1917. Age 29. Born on 20/05/1888. Son of Joseph Stevenson and his wife Ruth Jane (nee Hewett), of Laurel Avenue, Derrytrasna, Lurgan. Stevenson enlisted in the North Irish Horse at Hollywood, County Down, in April or May 1914 (No.943). In November 1916 Stevenson, together with around 100 other North Irish Horsemen, volunteered to transfer to the Royal Irish Rifles (No.40919). They embarked for France on 7 December, where they joined the 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles, on the Somme front. In early 1917 Stevenson was wounded, possibly during the attack in the sector in front of Bouchavesnes from 4 to 8 March, during which the 1st Battalion took significant casualties. The wound, however, was not severe, and he was able to rejoin his battalion soon after. On 16/08/1917 Stevenson's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. On 16/08/1917 Stevenson's battalion took part in the Battle of Langemarck, part of Third Ypres. The battalion war diary for the day listed 27 other ranks killed, 7 wounded and missing, 170 wounded, and 63 missing. Stevenson was one of those listed as wounded and missing, but he was later officially recorded as 'presumed dead'. His brother and sister-in-law, Robert Stevenson (a butter maker) and Ellen Stevenson (nee McKee), who lived in Cleveland, Ohio, USA placed a *For King and Country* notice in the *Newtownards Chronicle*. Son of Mrs. Agnes Stevenson, of 67, South St., Newtownards. Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium; Newtownards and District WM; Regent Street Methodist Church, Newtownards RH.

Memorial service for the late, Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge

A memorial service for the late, Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge, Royal Irish Fusiliers, and of all friends, especially of the Ulster and Canadian Divisions, who had laid down their lives in the war, was held in Tynan Parish Church on Sunday.

Many members of the Audience wore mourning armlets with the initials "J. S." ,embroidered thereon. Colonel Fitzgerald and Captain McElwaine represented the Irish Fusiliers.

The officiating clergy were his Grace the Lord Primate, Canon Tichbourne, Rev. N. St. G. Sides, and. the Rector, Rev. W. H. Fitzmaurice. The "Last Post " was sounded from the chancel by -bugler of the 10th Royal Irish Fusiliers,

under Bandmaster F. May. The collection was in aid of the funds of the Ulster Volunteer Hospital. Miss Hannah McMaster presided efficiently at the organ.

The Lord Primate based his address on the words "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life" -Rev. 22nd Chap., 10th verse.

He said to-day they were face to face with a conflict and a cross, and the only thing that gave them comfort and hope was the assurance of the crown of life.

In two memorable engagements the men of the Ulster Division had won undying fame not only for their own province but for the whole of Ireland. First of all on the 1st July last year at Thiepval, and on August 16th this year at what you they might call the fourth battle of Ypres, their province had lost thousands of their noblest and best, and the Division on both occasions tried to do the impossible. In between. In between these two dates there came the splendid fight at Messines, in which the men of Ulster helped to carry the flag to successful victory.

One great war correspondent spoke of the recent battle in these words :-
"For simple heroism and dogged fighting against overwhelming odds there has been no finer effort by any British troops since the war began."

It was in that fight that their beloved comrade, Sir James Stronge, fell, wounded unto death, after bringing up through shot and shell the supplies of water, food, and munitions that the men sorely needed.

He (his Grace) had read the testimony of officers and men alike to his patience, resourcefulness, and courage, One who had a right to speak said that Lieutenant Stronge never set his men a task to do that he would not gladly do himself. So considerate, so thoughtful of others, so whole-hearted in everything he did in his short life, the gallant young officer seemed to have compressed the work of fifty years and more. Thank God for the record of such a life!

And with Lieutenant Stronge's name that day they linked all those Ulstermen who had taught them by their lives and death the glory of sacrifice, of service, of duty and honour, more especially the men whose names were registered on the roll of honour of that parish. In conclusion, his Grace said it was a noble thing for their men to have offered their services in this war for God against the devil than to have rested quietly at home. They were all proud of their Ulstermen who had gone forth to save the world.

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Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge was killed in action during the "Third Battle of Ypres" otherwise battle of "Langemarck," **16th August, 1917**. James was the only son of James Henry Stronge, Baronet, and Ethel Margaret Strong nee Burges, of Tynan Abbey, Tynan, County Armagh. Deceased was twenty-six years of age, and is interred in Brandhoek New Military Cemetery No.3, Belgium. Grave Ref. II. F. 22. Lieutenant James Matthew Stronge is locally commemorated on the Armagh City War Memorial. Lieutenant Stronge's headstone epitaph reads:- "MORS JANUA VITAE." which translates to "Death is the door of life."
"We will remember them"

+THOMPSON, John Gunning

Royal Irish Rifles, 13th Btn. A Coy. Corporal. 17037. Died 16/08/1917. Age 23. Born on 19 /10/1896 in Back Street, Donaghadee. He was the eldest son and second child of Andrew and Elizabeth (Lizzie) Thompson (nee Gunning) who were married on 12/04/1893 in Donaghadee C of I Parish Church. Andrew Thompson was a son of John Thompson, a labourer. Lizzie Gunning was a daughter of James Gunning, a sailor. The Thompson family lived in Donaghadee, in Back Street, in Union Street, in Mount Street, in Bow Street and at 99 Moat Street. Andrew Thompson worked as a general labourer and he and Elizabeth had at least ten children. John Gunning Thompson enlisted in Donaghadee in 1914 and he served with the 13th Battalion Royal Irish Rifles in 108th Brigade of the 36th (Ulster) Division. In April 1916, John was home on a short leave from the trenches and later he was wounded in action on 01/07/1916. After he recovered, Corporal John Thompson returned to the fighting line and he was at the Battle of Langemarck. Initially Corporal John Thompson (No. 17037) was reported as wounded and missing in action. Then, in November 1917, it was officially confirmed that he must be presumed to have been killed in action on that date. His brother James Thompson died as the result of enemy action on 05/05/1941. Son of Andrew and Elizabeth Thompson, of 99, Moat St., Donaghadee. Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium; Donaghadee and District WM; Donaghadee C of I Parish Church RH. Also commemorated on the family grave headstone in Donaghadee Parish Church Graveyard

+THOMPSON, Scott

Ballymena Observer, August 31, 1917 - "The relatives of Rifleman Scott Thompson, Royal Irish Rifles, who reside at Lisnafillan, Galgorm, have received information to the effect that he was killed in the recent offensive. Rifleman Thompson was formerly employed in the Lisnafillan Bleaching Works. He was previously wounded and, after recovering, returned to the front. His brother Charles (Thompson) was lost in the recent disaster which overtook HMS Vanguard." Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium.

+TOPPING, Samuel

Royal Irish Rifles. 11th Btn. Rifleman. 7281. Died 16/08/1917. Age 45. Husband to Annie Topping, of 27, Millbrook Rd., Lisburn. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+TOSH, William

Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. 10th Btn. Private. 16059. Died 16/08/1917. Age 40. Husband of Rebecca Tosh, of 11, Windmill Terrace, Londonderry. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+VANCE, Brown

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 9th Btn. Private. 24582. Died 16/08/1917 during the Battle of Langemarck (Third Battle of Ypres). Age 21. He enlisted in Cookstown under an assumed name, Patrick McFalls. Son of Mrs. Marshall, of Killeefaddy, Magherafelt. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium

+VANCE, James

Royal Irish Rifles, 13th Btn. B Coy. Rifleman. 19236. Died 16/08/1917 at the Battle of Langemarck. Age 23. Enlisted in Newtownards and went to France on 06/10/1915. Born on 06/06/1894 in Upper Movilla Street, Newtownards. Son of James and Annie Vance (nee McMillan) who were married on 14/04/1884 in Greenwell Street Presbyterian Church Newtownards. The Vance family lived at 19 Greenwell Street and before that at 12 George's Street, Newtownards. James Vance Senior fought in the South African War and then he worked as a labourer. He and Annie had at least eleven children. Three brothers served during the Great War and only Alexander survived. He was discharged from the Army after suffering gas poisoning and being severely wounded – part of one foot was blown off in an explosion and he

needed a series of operations to remove shrapnel from his leg. Alexander Vance died in 1965 and was buried in Movilla Cemetery Newtownards alongside his father who died in 1937 and his mother who died in 1938. James Vance was the second of the two brothers to be killed during the Great War and, during the war, at least four of his siblings, his sister-in-law and his niece died of tuberculosis. Prior to the outbreak of the Great War James Vance worked in a factory. He played inside forward for the Ards Football Club and in one newspaper report he was described as having outstanding ability. There was a prediction that James was destined for stardom on the football field. The report stated that 'his ability to shield and control the ball was legendary'. Royal Irish Rifles, 12th Btn. Rifleman. 19298. Died 16/08/1917. Age 27. Enlisted in September 1914. He was wounded at the Somme on 01/07/1916, receiving a gunshot wound to the right arm. Prior to enlisting he was in the employment of the Braidwater Spinning Company. Only son of Robert Watson, Alexander Street, Ballymena and brother of Mrs. Sarah Russell of 6, Henry Street, Harryville, Ballymena. Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium.

Canadian Infantry, 10th Btn, A Coy. Lance Corporal. 231117. Military Medal. Died 16/08/1918. Aged 27. Born 07/05/1891. Son of Mr. and Mrs. George Jervis, of Belfast, Ireland. Husband to Annie Jervis, of 302, Irving Road, Victoria, British Columbia. On enlistment he was living with his wife at 10966, 122 Street, Edmonton, Alberta and he was working as a telephone inspector. Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery, Somme, France. St Jude's C of I Church, Belfast, WM

+LAVERTY, Joseph

Royal Irish Rifles, 13th Btn. Second Lieutenant. Died 16/08/1918. Member of the QUB Training Corps 1915 - 16. Joseph was a National School teacher. He had held posts at Edenderry in Omagh, Ballinalee, Wilson's Hospitals Endowed School in Westmeath and Newtownards Model School before being appointed principal at Castlerobin National School, Lisburn (just north of Sale's Corner), where he appears to have lived. He married Gretta Diver in Omagh on 22/07/1910. Gretta was also a teacher. She died on 23/07/1913, three years and a day after they were married. She was 26 years old. He was KIA in Belgium, a year after first going to the front. Son of James and Margaret Lavery. Brother of W.J. Lavery, York Road, Belfast. He was born in Tobermore on 08/12/1886. Tyne Cot Memorial, Panel 138, West Vlanderen, Belgium. Joseph Lavery and Gretta Lavery are named on a family memorial in St Eugenius Church of Ireland churchyard, Cappagh, outside Omagh.

+McCLELLAND, Wesley Charles

North Irish Horse. Private. 71062. Died 16/08/1918. After taking part in the action of the German Spring Offensive of March 1918, the regiment was further reduced when an officer and 13 men were attached to 64th Brigade, 21st Division on 14/08/1918. Two days later Private Wesley McClelland died

in action as the division prepared for another attack on the Somme. Born on 31/01/1890 in Cookstown. He was one of twelve children, eleven surviving. His father was a baker and grocer with a shop in William Street. Wesley was a baker also. Wesley enlisted in Cookstown. Ancre British Cemetery, Beaumont-Hamel, France. Cookstown WM

+SIMPSON, Joseph James

Royal Irish Fusiliers, 1st Btn Private. 49824. Died. 16/08/1918. Age 29. Eldest son of John and Matilda (nee Kennedy) Simpson. James Simpson was the eldest of six children. He was born on the 09/10/1888 at Ballymully, Moneymore. His father was a farmer. He enlisted at Finner Camp, County Donegal with the 10th Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers. In the spring of 1918 the Battalion were disbanded and he was transferred to the 1st Btn. Bertinacres Military Cemetery, Fletre, Nord, France. Moneymore WM

Royal Irish Rifles, 3rd Btn. D Coy. Rifleman. 23837. Died 16/08/1919. Age 19. Son of William James and Mary Atkinson, of 101, Mountcollyer Rd., Belfast. Carnmoney Cemetery

Royal Army Service Corps, 906th Coy. Serjeant. EMT/57074. Died 07/08/1920. Age 37. 906 Company, ASC, was formed in February 1917 and disbanded in June 1922 They served with Ismailia District in Egypt, as Corps Troops with the Desert Mounted Corps, and with North Force. Their role was 52 Auxiliary (Petrol) Company. Born 23/09/1882. Son of James and Elizabeth Lynn, of Mousetown, Coalisland, Co. Tyrone. His father was a railway porter. Elizabeth was a dress maker. One of four brothers who died on service, two of whom are buried in Belgium, one in France and the fourth in Israel. Haifa War Cemetery, Israel and Palestine (including Gaza). Dungannon WM

New Zealand Infantry, 18th Btn. Private. 29318. Died 16/08/1944. Aged 24. Gilmore's 18th Battalion was part of the 2nd New Zealand Division under Lieutenant General Bernard C. Freyberg. They fought in Greece, Crete, the Western Desert, and Italy, playing a prominent role at El Alamein. In April 1941, the 2nd New Zealand Division deployed to Greece. There, they combined with Australian and British troops as W Force under Lieutenant-General Sir Henry Maitland Wilson.

Germany overwhelmed the Allied troops in what became the Battle of Greece. W Force retreated to Crete and Egypt. The final remaining New Zealanders evacuated by 25/04/1941. 291 of their number were killed, 387 wounded and a further 1,826 taken captive. Private John Gilmore was taken prisoner of war. His place of capture was listed as Greece. He likely died in captivity in a German Prisoner of War Camp.

He was a labourer in Wellington before enlisting. Born in Belfast, he was the son of John Gilmore and Margaret Gilmore. 1939-1945 War Cemetery, Charlottenburg, Berlin, Germany.

+VINCENT, Leonard John

Welch Regiment. 1/5th Btn. Lance Corporal. 3962594. Died 16/08/1944. Age 23 . Son of William John and Alice Mary Vincent; husband of Annie Teresa Vincent, of Newry. Raanville War Cemetery, France

VETERANS

ARMSTRONG, James Rowan

RAFVR. Wing Commander. MRCS and FRCS 1938. MB BCh BAO Belfast 1933. MCh 1941. MD 1938.

James Armstrong came from a staunchly medical Belfast family but spent very little of his life in his native province. His father John was a surgeon and sometime Member of Council of the RCS Ireland; his mother Maria, née Rowan, was a doctor, as were three of his brothers and his sister.

James was born on 03/06/1910 in Ballymena, County Antrim. He was Educated at Dungannon Royal School and at Queen's University, Belfast, where he qualified in 1933. His father introduced him to basic surgery, teaching him to exploit his ambidexterity and to operate with equal facility with either hand. After his house jobs he left for London, where he took a number of Junior surgical appointments in smaller hospitals and was inspired by Dickson Wright's operative skill. At Charing Cross Hospital he was orthopaedic registrar with David Trevor, confirming his inclination towards that specialty. After gaining his FRCS in 1938 he was for a time surgical registrar to the Metropolitan Hospital, but having already joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve he was called up soon after the outbreak of war. Much of his war service was at RAF Ely, where as a surgical specialist he developed his orthopaedics and on the treatment of fractures by bone grafting. He rose to the rank of wing commander.

His first consultant post was at the Royal Waterloo, followed by appointments at the Manor House, the Metropolitan and Lambeth Hospitals. The last named was later taken over by St Thomas's, with which the staff was integrated. His particular expertise was in the management of the prolapsed intervertebral disc by laminectomy. His book *Lumbar disc lesions* was first published in 1952 and went through three editions; he co-authored *Injury in sport* with W E Tucker.

As a sportsman he excelled, playing both cricket and rugby for his university and golf for his County (handicap 2); salmon and trout fishing increasingly occupied his later years. His wife commented that he always selected his

house surgeons from among the more sporting types on the grounds that they might be more intelligent and would work harder so that they could have time off. This worked well enough (apart from the odd 'patching up' that had to be done on Monday mornings) until a yachtsman was stranded on the other side of the world and was away for longer than anyone had anticipated!

He was a very private person who could seem austere, declining to take part in any committee work or social activities, but to those who knew him well he was a warm and loyal friend and could be immensely entertaining as a raconteur. He was married twice but had no children. After the dissolution of his first marriage he took good care to teach the lady who was to become his second wife, Patricia Timpson, to be both keen and competent on the golf course and the river before he married her. He died on 16/08/1996 after a long illness. Acknowledgment - Royal College of Surgeons of England, Plarr's Lives of the Fellows

BURKE, Aubrey

Corporal Aubrey Burke (7046114) served in 2nd Battalion, Royal Ulster Rifles during the Second World War. He was the son of William James Burke and Elizabeth Burke of Portadown, Co. Armagh, and the husband to R.C. Burke of 9 Meadow Lane, Portadown, Co. Armagh.

Before joining the Royal Ulster Rifles, Aubrey found himself in trouble as an 18-year-old recruit to the Royal Irish Fusiliers. Along with George Graham, he illegally entered the office of Richard Keown of Ballyhornan, Co. Down. The pair stole a total of £1,10s. Burke plead guilty and the British Army dealt with proceedings. Mr. Justice Brown returned Burke and Graham to army life, sparing them prison as it was a first offence. Both the young recruits paid the Crown Solicitor a total of £2 each towards legal costs.

In February 1944, Aubrey married his wife who served in the Auxiliary Territorial Service. His brother William Burke also served in the Second World War as a gunner in the Royal Artillery. An older brother Robert Burke was recently discharged and a sister worked in a local N.A.A.F.I.

Corporal Burke returned to the front after the wedding and by June 1944 was in Normandy with 2nd Battalion, Royal Ulster Rifles who landed on D-Day. Under heavy shelling, Burke sustained a back injury. While recovering in hospital, he wrote home to tell the family how he had taken nine prisoners of war the night before the attack.

Corporal Burke died on 16/08/1946 aged 23 years old as a result of a tragic boating accident on the River Bann in Portadown, Co. Armagh. Recently demobilised, Burke had returned to his hometown. On 16/08/1946, he and his 8-year-old nephew Oswald Matchett were on the banks of the river when they spotted two young boys in a small boat. They were 14-year-old Wilson Joyce of Portmore Street and 13-year-old George Ford of Clonavon Avenue. Burke shouted across the river asking for a lift along the river to where his wife awaited in another boat. The four then proceeded down the river in the direction of Seagoe.

Close to the factory of Hamilton and Robb Ltd., the stronger Burke swapped rowing duties with young Joyce. As the two swapped places, the boat overturned. Burke, Joyce, and Ford clung on to the upturned vessel but 8-year-old Matchett disappeared beneath the water. Burke released his hold on the boat, diving under to rescue his nephew. However, the injuries sustained in Normandy left the Corporal a rather weak swimmer.

Aubrey Burke and Oswald Matchett disappeared from sight in an area of thick weeds and concealed mud. Joyce and Ford shouted for help. Factory workers from Hamilton and Robb Ltd. pulled the boys ashore and administered first aid. Employees Herbert Nicholson, William Holland, William Brown, and Evan Jennett dived in the river to begin the search for Burke and Matchett.

By the afternoon, a total of eight boats were partaking in the search coordinated by District Inspector T.P.R. Kenny and Head Constable G. Steele of Portadown R.U.C. Among those involved in the search was Burke's brother William. Their efforts were to no avail, however, and both Aubrey Burke and young Oswald Matchett were drowned in the river.

Corporal Burke's grave is in Old Ground, Grave 1167 of Seagoe Cemetery, Portadown, Co. Armagh. In 2018, his name was a new addition to the Portadown War Memorial, Portadown, Co. Armagh.

KANE, George Alfred Kane

RAMC. OBE, TD. He joined the Royal Army Medical Corps in 1932 but resigned his commission in 1934 to return to dispensing practice in Ballymena and to be medical officer of health.

Dr. Kane served in the army during the second world war and was wounded at Dunkirk. He served in Persia and Iraq and was second hygiene officer Second Army from Normandy to Lunenburg Heath.

He was responsible for the sanitary clearing of Belsen and other concentration camps, for which he was awarded a military OBE. He was also

present at the surrender of the German medical services at Lunenburg Heath in 1945.

He returned to general practice and took an active interest in public health matters. For 32 years he was medical officer of the Royal Ulster Rifles, later the Royal Irish Rangers, at the Ballymena regimental depot.

Born 1907; he qualified at Queen's University Belfast 1931; DPH.

Dr. Kane was a keen fisherman, an avid golfer, and a born raconteur, always the life and soul of the party. He died on 16/08/2000 and was survived by his wife, Marion; three sons (two of whom are doctors); and five grandchildren.
