On this day in 1915 "The Witness" a Presbyterian Church newsmagazine reports on the UVF at Clandeboye Camp similar to others at Newcastle and Ballykinlar. In 1915 the Battle of Loos begins, and the London Irish Rifles go over the top. Today we record the record of service of 52 men from NI in both wars and all services.

On this Day - September 25

1914

Life in Clandeboys Camp

The Witness reports - The men from provincial regiments of the U.V.F. are at Clandeboye, East Belfast is at Ballykinlar, and North, South, and West Belfast are at Donard Lodge, Newcastle, and in all there are at present about 10,000 Volunteers under canvas. Clandeboye, which is called the model camp, is situated in the beautiful grounds of Clandeboye demesne, which has been generously placed at the disposal of the military authorities by the Marchioness of Dufferin and Ava, who has always manifested such a deep and practical interest in the progress and equipment of the Ulster Volunteer Force. That it is an ideal spot both from a utilitarian and health standpoint is apparent to the ordinary civilian. The camp is pitched in the midst of broad fields, which afford every opportunity for extended military exercises. From a spectacular point of view the aspect is equally pleasing. Over 400 of the ordinary military bell tents have been pitched on sloping ground, and the men sleep on straw palliasses on boarded floors. The camp as a whole is represented by a rather superior class of recruit, many of whom have given up good positions and left comfortable homes in order to serve their country. Every possible facility

has been granted by the authorities for the convenience of the recruits. The messing arrangements, one of the most important factors, are completely satisfactory, and the sanitation of the camp is all that could be desired. The catering for the officers' mess is carried out to their entire satisfaction by the Ulster Menu Company, who have a permanent staff resident in camp. A plentiful supply of water, has been laid, and telephone communication with Belfast is at present being established, and will be completed in a few days. The training which the men are undergoing consists principally of drill. Reveille is sounded at 6 a.m., and from then until teatime, with intervals for meals and lectures, the recruits are principally engaged at drill. The interval between teatime and "lights out" at 10 p.m. is devoted, almost entirely to recreation. The camp is daily open to visitors. The Witness 25/09/1914

1915

Allied offensive begins in Loos and Champagne. The British fleet co-operating on the Belgian coast. British attack south of La Bassee Canal and five miles of enemy trenches captured, including Hohenzollern Redoubt which is stormed with partial success.

The London Irish Rifles went 'over the top' to begin the Battle of Loos. Major Beresford – blew his whistle &cried "Irish – up and over". As they walked into No-Man's Land, they kicked a football along till they reached the German trenches.

Farewell tribute to 2nd Royal Irish Rifles

Major General Haldane's farewell tribute to 2nd R Irish Rifles after they lost heavily in the diversionary attack which held the Germans in the Ypres Salient on September 25,1915

Below is a report from contemporary newspaper.

Ballymena men killed and wounded as Rifles make history

The following text is of Major General Haldane's farewell to the 2nd Btn. Royal Irish Rifles on the occasion of their removal from his command:-

Reference is made in it to the recent advance and the part taken in it by the 2nd Rifles. It was during this glorious action that 2nd Lt. Gordon Caruth was killed and Lt. S. A. Bell was wounded.

General Haldane said: "I have just got the opportunity to say a few words to you before leaving. You are going to a more quiet part of the line and you will be under an Irish General there and perhaps he will understand you better than I do.

"You have a splendid fighting record throughout the campaign, being complimented by Sir John French and General Smith Dorrien in corps orders. The fighting in this part of the line during the last few months has been very severe and this battalion has made history.

"When the history of this campaign is written the name of the 2nd RIR will be written in large print. Your commanding officer, Colonel Weir, has been promoted to a brigade, due largely to the conduct of the battalion on 25th September. Your brigadier was ordered to hold the Germans in the Ypres Salient while the other corps made the attack further south. You attacked the strongest position in the enemy's line.

"We had not enough artillery ammunition in our line to give you more support. The result was that the Germans' hidden machine guns and cleverly laid barbed wire traps were not demolished entirely. All the big gun ammunition was required further south.

"Your clever demonstration in front of this part of the line brought all the enemy's reserves to this point, thereby facilitating the offensive towards Loos. In fact, the enemy were prepared to attack but were half an hour too late. On reading the report, I found that the Royal Irish Rifles notwithstanding the enemy's preparation, not only pierced the German lines but actually held their first line trenches for 24 hours, but on account of the corps on their flanks failing to achieve their object, the battalion was unfortunately obliged to retire to their own lines, having no one in support on their flanks.

"It was a splendid bit of work and proves that Irishmen will always get to the front no matter what obstacles are in their way. On that day you filled the German trenches with dead with that little weapon, the bayonet, which, when in an Irishman's hand is filled with life itself.

"I am sorry to lose you but one has to bow to higher authority. I suppose you are sorry to say goodbye to this spot? (laughter) The heaviest fighting has always been here so if I ever find myself in difficulties I will always count on the help of your battalion."

In this fighting the 2nd Btn RIR lost 15 officers killed, wounded and missing with a large number of the men suffering similarly.

1917

At Ypres the Germans penetrate between Tower Hamlets ridge and Polygon Wood. South-East London is raided by German planes. Reports of 9 killed and 23 injured. German Zeppelins attack the Yorkshire and Lincolnshire coasts injuring 3.

1939

More than 1,200 German planes bomb Warsaw. To this day, September 25 is remembered in Poland as "Black Monday."

Highland Light Infantry, 11^h Btn. Private. 19636. Died 25/09/15. Volunteered in Glasgow. Son of David, Flushtown, Strabane. Loos Memorial, France

+ANDERSON, William

Highland Light Infantry. 12 Btn. Private. 17537. Died 25/09/1915. Born in Dromara, or Dromore, Co. Down, he lived in Lanark. Enlisted at Dunoon, Argyllshire. Loos Memorial, panels 108-112, Pas de Calais, France

+ANDREWS, Robert Hutchinson

Royal Irish Rifles, 1st Btn. Formerly North Irish Horse. Second Lieutenant. Died 25/09/1915. Age 27. He was one of the first to enlist after the war began, joining the North Irish Horse on 10/08/1914 (No.994). His profession at the time was civil engineer, and he was living with his family at Fernhill House, Annaclone, Banbridge. He embarked for France on 20/08/1914 with C Squadron, taking part in the retreat from Mons and advance to the Aisne. On 01/09/1915 he was appointed to the rank of trumpeter, and on 28/07/1915 was sent to the officer cadet school at St Omer

for a course of instruction. He was commissioned a month later and posted to the 1st Battalion Royal Irish Rifles. Andrews joined the regiment as it prepared to make a smallscale attack on the German trenches at Bois Grenier. The purpose was to pin down enemy reserves while the main attack took place at Loos that day, 25 September. The officer was killed when a German shell ignited a load of smoke candles brought forward for use in the attack. The Battalion diary for the day includes the following: C & D Corps were heavily shelled from 4.30am to 3.30pm, but suffered comparatively slight casualties. 2nd Lieut Andrews was killed. Apart from Andrews, the Battalion lost two officers wounded, 11 other ranks killed, 76 wounded and 15 missing in the day's action. Born in the parish of Ballybrick, near Banbridge, Co. Sanda was sunk by German shore batteries off the coast of Zeebrugge, Belgium. "The death of Lieutenant Commander Gartside Tipping, R.N. reported from the front is another of those grave incidents that bring home more intimately to us here in Fermanagh the tragedy of the war. The deceased gentleman was a son of the late Captain Gartside Tipping of Rossferry, near Derrylin, one of Lough Erne's most picturesque residences, afterwards occupied by the Hon. Cyril Ward on his marriage with a daughter of the Earl of Erne. He was a brother of Mrs. Richardson, of Rossfad, with whom profound sympathy will be felt in her bereavement. The family are relatives of the Earl of Erne. The Lieutenant-Commander, although one of the oldest officers actively engaged in the British navy, being 67 years of age, gallantly offered his services on the outbreak of the war. When the present King, then Prince George, was undergoing an early course of naval instruction he was lieutenant on of the Royal yacht. For many years he was inspector of lifeboats in the Irish and West Lancashire

George Harrison Ross was an aerated water manufacturer. Brewing and glassmaking feature prominently in the history of the Ross family. Kenneth's grandfather, William Adolphus Ross, founded the *W A Ross & Co Royal Belfast Ginger Ale and Aerated Water Manufacturing Works* in 1879.

Four of their six sons were on active service in the Great War – Melbourne, Harrison, Kenneth and Wason. Their daughter Lorna served as a Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD) nurse in Malta and Salonika and, during the Second World War, she served in the Women's Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF). The Voluntary Aid Detachment was an organisation formed when the British Red Cross Society linked up with the Order of St John of Jerusalem.

George Harrison Ross died on 30/09/1917 (aged 72) knowing that two of his sons, Melbourne and Kenneth, had been killed in action. Rifleman Wason Ross was killed in action some seven months after his father died. Lieutenant Harrison Ross was wounded twice during the Great War, survived and was on active service again during the Second World War.

Kenneth Ross was educated at Portora Royal School in Enniskillen, Eastman's Naval School at Winchester, Queen's University Belfast (entered 1908. He obtained a BSc degree) and London University. Kenneth worked for six months as a Research Chemist at Woolwich Arsenal. One of the articles Kenneth Ross wrote for the Journal of the Chemical Society was co-authored by Cecil Crymble. (Crymble also fought in the war and died in November 1914).

The first objective was Les Briques Trench, The 2nd objective was the German 2nd line trenches, West of Haisnes. "At 0550 hours on 25/09/1915 all companies were in position and the gas cylinders were opened up. There was no breeze and the poisonous gasses hung mostly over our own trenches causing a good deal of alarm to our troops and many men suffered from its effects before going over the parapet".

At 0630 hours the attack was launched, all lines rose out of their trenches simultaneously and advanced under a very heavy machine gun rifle and shell fire. The first line were practically wiped out before they had gone 20yards, the 2nd and 3rd lines lost heavily before they reached their own 1st line. By the time all the 3 first

companies were over, the Battalion had lost 70% of the men who went over the top and about 85% of the officers. At 0645 hours 'C' company advanced about 1/4hour afterwards and also lost heavily. The survivors of the 10th Battalion got back to their trenches at about 1130 hours and were withdrawn from the Front line trenches. Loses had been horrendous. Private William Woods body was never recovered. From Carrickfergus, St Nicholas' Parish Church Fallen. Loos Memorial, France

BEVERIDGE, Arthur Joseph

RAMC. Major General. CB. OBE, MC, Norwegian Military Cross, MiD 24/12/1917. Belvedere College Dublin, NUI and QUB. MB, NUI 1915, BCh, BAO, LM, MSc, NUI 1929, PDH, QUB 1926. Arthur, and his identical twin brother James (Jim) O'Shaughnessy Beveridge, RAMC, were matriculated, in 1910, into UCD Medical School (Cecilia Street) and did their clinical training at St Vincent's Hospital. They both joined the Royal College of Surgeons Officer Training Corps. Arthur gained a commission of Lieutenant in the Medical Services (Special Reserve) on 27/07/1914. He mobilized on 19/07/1915, and entered the war in France on 05/06/1916. He was promoted to Captain on 19/01/1916. Arthur's brother Jim died from wounds on 22/11/1917, and the chaplain who was with Jim when he died did not have far to go to break the news to his twin. Arthur had had a premonition that something dreadful was about to happen. He was so grief-stricken that he could not carry on at the front, and was given three months' compassionate leave. He returned to Dublin and spent six weeks shut up alone in his room, speaking to no-one. Arthur returned to the war, he was awarded the Military Cross "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His dressing station was heavily shelled during an engagement, but owing to his determination, courage and initiative, a large number of wounded were attended to and evacuated from the danger zone." He received the General Service Medal and clasp for his service in Iraq during 1919 - 1920. Arthur continued to serve with the Medical Services until he retired on the 21/03/1958.
