Sailors in the trenches. Part 2

3 Gallipoli

At Blandfold the Division regrouped and re-formed. In January 1915 the RND was informed of the plans for the Dardanelles.

The Marine Brigade was ordered to leave immediately. In February 1915, the RND embarked and sailed to the Greek island of Lemnos in Mudros Bay in the

eastern Mediterranean to take part in the disastrous Gallipoli campaign.

The Dardanelles campaign had three major challenges:

- The fortresses at the end of the Gallipoli peninsula
- The mines and enemy shipping in the passage to Constantinople
- Putting ashore men and munitions at various locations on the peninsula, establishing a mobile force to obtain an increasing amount of territory and thus prevent the stalemate of entrenched warfare as had happened in Europe.

Naval vessels led by HMS Queen Elizabeth bombarded the forts. Much of this activity was wasteful. Shells designed to attack warships were unsuited to the destruction of well-established earthworks. Three battleships were sunk. The RND was returned to Egypt and then to Lemnos.

Eventually on Sunday 25th April landings were made on five beaches. There were errors in arriving at two of the selected beaches, the limited access inland along well enfiladed gullies led to a loss of life of epic scale.

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Despite gallant attempts the post-landings situation was of a static front line. After eight and a half months the RND was withdrawn and returned to Lemnos. The cost of the RND's involvement in Gallipoli was high - a combination of battle and infections, dysentry being rife. The RND lost one- third of its force committed - 372 officers and 7,198 other ranks.

Operations: June-July 1915.

In the Helles sector, which had been extensively entrenched by both sides, the Allies attacked Krithia and Achi Baba again, in the Third Battle of Krithia on 4 June, with the 29th

Division, Royal Naval Division, 42nd Division and two French divisions.

The battle plan for this Third Battle of Krithia included The Royal Naval Division which would attack up Achi Baba Nullah (also known as Kanli Dere or Bloody Valley), supported by the armoured cars on Krithia Spur.

The Royal Naval Division's advance was led by the 2nd Naval Brigade which managed to reach and capture the Ottoman trenches. When the second wave—the Collingwood Battalion—attempted to continue the advance,

they were caught in enfilade fire from Kereves Dere to the right where the French advance had failed. The battalion, one of the newly arrived reinforcements, was utterly annihilated and was never reformed. Further attempts to reach the second objective were successful,

but the position was untenable, so within a couple of hours the RND units had retreated to their starting positions.

After this Third Battle of Krithia failure, the possibility of a decisive breakthrough was gone and trench warfare resumed, with objectives being measured in hundreds of yards. Casualties were approximately 25% on both sides; the British lost 4,500 from 20,000 men

4 The Western Front

In the Commonwealth War cemeteries along the Western Front, the seried ranks of army corps and regimental badges are broken by the symbols of furled anchors marking the resting paces of the remains of the members of the Royal Naval Division.

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One of the most distinctive actions of the RN Division was on the 13th November 1916 at Beaucourt when 12,000 sailors went over the top and in two days in winter went further and took more prisoners than the army had done in a day.

By the end of the Division's part in the Gallipoli campaign, very few men with sea service remained. The RND was always regarded as being different to the rest of the army and although they were subsumed into the army in 1916 to become the 63rd (Royal Navy) Division, they were the only formation to wear both Navy and Army badges of rank.

Attempts to convert the RND to conform to army practices were tried but were generally unsuccessful, especially an attempt to disband the RND in 1917 which was thwarted by the influence of the First Lord of Admiralty, Sir Edward Carson.

The Division transferred from the authority of the Admiralty to the War Office on 29 April 1916 and was redesignated as the 63rd (Royal Naval) Division on 19 July 1916.

The Division moved to France, arriving Marseilles 12-23 May 1916, after which it remained on the Western Front for the rest of the war and took part in the following engagements:

Royal Naval Division on active service renders it impossible to reply personally in each case. Correspondents, therefore, receiving this form are asked to be so good as to understand it to signify that the Record Office has no news (or, in cases where a previous report has been made, no further news) of the subject of their inquiry. In all cases where information is received a personal communication will be made at once to the next of kin. With reference to men reported wounded, it is to be observed that a telegram from the base office at Alexandria states "all wounded can be assumed progressing satisfactorily unless reported seriously ill." These reports as to serious condition are telegraphic, and are communicated immediately to the relatives by this department.'

"Attached as M.O. to the 14th Battalion Irish Rifles, he died in France on Nov. 1st, 1917, as the result of an accident while riding up to the trenches at night along a wooded road. His horse took fright, bolted, slipped and fell, throwing Captain Gavin on his head, and inflicting such serious injuries that he died shortly after reaching the casualty clearing station. Seaforth Highlanders. 2nd Btn. Private. S/2127. Died 02/11/1918. William Jamfrey was eldest son of Thomas and Elizabeth Jamfrey. He was born on 10/04/1888 in Omagh. Interesting he was named William Jeffers. He was one of seven children. All the children were born in Cookstown except William. By 1911 William, his brother and his father were all employed as railway porters. The 1911 census lists William Jamfrey as age 22, living with the family at house 1 in Coolnafranky, Cookstown. From then on his surname was 'Jeffers'. William Jamfrey's brother. James Jamfrey, enlisted in the Royal Navy about 1919. He was killed in World War Two on 02/10/1942. Family moved to Bangor. By 1911 his father had died and he and his brother were running the farm. He moved to near Manchester and was employed as a steelworker. +WHALMSLEY, Charles Henry

RNVR. Lieutenant. MiD. Died 02/11/1941 in HM Submarine Tetrarch off Sicily. Age 27. After a period of intense action, Lt. Walmsley was hitching a lift from Malta to the UK on the submarine Tetrarch. Mentioned in Despatches (posthumously), London Gazette 07/04/1942. He had completed seventeen Central Mediterranean War Patrols with HM Ships Unbeaten, Upholder and Ursula. Torpedoed three large escorted Italian transports off Tripoli 18/09/1941. Sank the Italian Torpedo Boat Albatross off Cape Rascolmo, north Sicily on 27/09/1941. Tetrarch sailed from Alexandria on 17/10/1941 for Malta to adjust complement before proceeding to refit in USA. The submarine arrived at Malta on 24/10/1941, and left again on 26/10/1941 at 1700. Routing instructions were communicated from Gibraltar by the Flag Officer Commanding North Atlantic on the afternoon of 25th and also requested that she report her position, course and speed. Tetrarch did not respond and was never seen again. The loss cannot be ascribed to any known enemy anti-submarine attacks, and it was assumed that mining was the most likely cause of her loss beyond the Sicilian Channel off Cavioli island. Son of James Charles and Margaret Walmsley, Kilkeel, brother of Basil Walmisley, Knockdene Pk., Belfast. Valetta WM.

+GREER, Robert

Royal Marines. Sergeant. CH/X 3121. Died 02/11/1944. Aged 36. Fellow Marine Robert Clark (CH/X 111645) died alongside him off the coast of Belgium during the Battle of Walcheren. Born 12/12/1907 at 15 Dagmar Street, Belfast. Son of Robert Greer and Mary Jane Greer (née Moorhead). His father died on 20/11/1909 when Robert was one year old. In 1915, a motor car struck Robert Greer as he crossed the road at Peter's Hill, Belfast. He sustained serious head injuries and an ambulance transported him to the Royal Victoria Hospital. On 12/09/1931, Robert married Margherita Guiseppa Carla Maria Joanna Whitworth, who was born in Senglea, Malta. The ceremony took place in St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church, Chatham, Kent. In 1939 the couple were living with their three children at 252 Pier Road, Gillingham, Kent. Oostende New Communal Cemetery, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium.

+McILWAINE, Andrew

RAF. Leading Aircraftman. 546234. Died 02/11/1946. Aged 29. Son of Frank and Mary Cosgrove of Belfast; Husband to Elizabeth Cosgrove of Belfast. Milltown Roman Catholic Cemetery

+STEVENSON, Wilson

Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment. Officer Cadet. 6355702. Died 02/11/1946. Age 19. Served in the Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment during the Second World War. Born on 10/12/1927, he was the son of the late William Stevenson and Margaret Stevenson (née Kernohan) of Crankill, Ballymena, Co. Antrim. William and Margaret married on 23/07/1925 in Teeshan, Ballymena, before moving to Birkenhead, Merseyside, England, where Wilson was born. The couple also had a daughter Helen Margaret Stevenson born on 7th September 1935 who died in infancy on 15th November 1935. William received the Military Medal for gallantry in the field while serving as a Corporal with North Irish Horse in The Great War. He enlisted in November 1915 and served in France in 1916. He later worked in the hardware trade before his death on 12/11/1944. Officer Cadet Wilson Stevenson died as a result of a motorcycling accident in Liverpool, Lancashire, England. He was returning to his Regiment based at Warrington, Lancashire, England, and spent several weeks in hospital receiving treatment for his injuries. His death occurred at Winwick Military Hospital, Cheshire, England. The funeral service took place on the morning of 05/11/1946. Ballymena New Cemetery. His name does not feature on the Ballymena War Memorial.

His parents, Mr. Samuel Reid (hotel proprietor & merchant) and Mrs. Jeannie Henry, lived at Dun Suivnish, Galvally, Portstewart; he was their eldest son and was born on 14/12/1897. His father was Chairman of Portstewart Urban District Council. Stuart was still living at Dun Suivnish when he died on 02/11/1965; he was buried in Agherton Cemetery. He is commemorated on Portstewart Presbyterian Church's Roll of Honour and the Roll of Honour of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. (Coleraine Chronicle of 24-11-1917, 15-12-1917, 26-01-1918, 18-05-1918, 07-12-1918 & 26-07-1919; Northern Constitution of 16-09-1916,
